Eighth Annual Conference of the Commonwealth Caribbean Association of Integrity Commissions and Anti-Corruption Bodies (CCAICACB) at the Marriott Resort, Frigate Bay, St Kitts

CONFERENCE COMMUNIQUÉ

- We, the Commonwealth Caribbean Association of Integrity Commissions and Anti-Corruption Bodies ("the Association"), meeting at our Eighth Annual Regional Conference convened under the auspices of the Commonwealth Secretariat and hosted by the St Kitts Integrity Commission under the theme:

 Controlling Corruption: Preventative Mechanisms work better than Reactive Measures;
- NOTING with deep gratitude the invaluable support and warm hospitality provided by the Government and people of St Kitts and Nevis, the St Kitts Integrity Commission, and the Nevis Integrity Commission; the remarks by His Excellency, Sir S. W. Tapley Seaton, GCMG, CVO, QC, JP, LLD, Governor-General of St. Kitts and Nevis for declaring the Conference open; the Hon. Vincent Byron Jr., Attorney General of St Kitts and Nevis for his remarks and for deputizing for Dr The Hon. Timothy Harris, Prime Minister; Dr The Rt Hon. Denzil Douglas, former Prime Minister of St Kitts & Nevis; and the Rt. Hon. Baroness Patricia Scotland QC, Commonwealth Secretary-General who was present and delivered an address;
- 3) **RECOGNISING** also the need to continue to use this regional platform for the sharing and implementation of best practices and strategies for combating corruption and the promotion of good governance;
- 4) **HAVING** extensively discussed the theme of the conference and its programme content, with a full exchange of views of participants;

AGREED AND ADOPTED the following resolutions: -

- a. continue to reiterate the need for regional Integrity Commissions and Anti-corruption Bodies to maintain their independence, impartiality and professionalism, to further enhance their effectiveness;
- b. make relevant recommendations to our Governments with a view to modernising, enacting and

bringing into operation relevant legislation to continuously combat corruption;

- c. continue our calls on Member Governments to provide adequate financial, technical, and other resources (human or otherwise) to the Integrity Commissions and Anti-Corruption Bodies, and greater autonomy in the use of those resources;
- d. urge governments to enact, expand and implement national legislative frameworks and strategies for improved effectiveness, so that there are no legislative silos which deter holistic Integrity Commission and Anti-Corruption work in the region;
- e. urge governments of the Commonwealth Caribbean to do whatever is necessary to ensure that respective commissions are fully constituted and functional; and further urge that when vacancies occur to fill them expeditiously;
- f. plan to establish a permanent secretariat, and employ an Administrative Secretary on a part-time basis;
- g. invite CARICOM and other internationally recognised organisations to collaborate with CCAICACB in anti-corruption efforts, integrity building and capacity building;
- h. foster greater networking and coordination among national and regional agencies to strengthen anticorruption work;
- i. continue our work based on the premise that Preventative measures are complementary to Enforcement, Investigations, Litigation and Asset Recovery;
- j. place greater emphasis and provide more resources on preventative measures and Public Education;
- advocate that anti-corruption is placed in the curriculum in the formal education system, being mindful that public and formal education enhances desirable behaviour patterns and helps to sustain a cultural shift at all levels;
- I. utilize traditional and social media effectively to promote anti-corruption;
- m. encourage governments to analyze and streamline procurement processes as a means to proactively prevent corruption;
- n. promote and embrace blockchain technology as an excellent means of preventing corruption;

- o. encourage governments to develop, implement, review and update codes of conduct, to reduce conflicts of interest and promote an ethical culture;
- adopt effective and relevant organisational risk management strategies and information gathering techniques;
- q. seek the technical assistance and support of the Commonwealth Secretariat and request that the Commonwealth Secretariat provide further education on the adoption of the 22 Anti-Corruption Benchmarks;
- r. continue to mobilise youth to understand the importance of integrity and ethics and the causes and effects of corruption on our society;
- s. to adopt the life cycle approach to anti-corruption and educate persons from cradle to grave;
- t. promote the work of each Member Country through the use of internet platforms such as dedicated websites;
- u. support each Member Country in its anti-corruption and integrity work within the unique context of each Country; and
